5 Habits of Great Writers: Idea, Evidence, Organization, Language, Conventions	
100% (A) 4 points	 Has a clear, focused, and compelling claim that unites the piece Consistently chooses the most illuminating and relevant evidence to support the claim Consistently groups related evidence to build momentum and prove the claim Includes clear, simple, and elegant language with no redundancy Grammar and spelling exceed grade-level expectations
85% (B) 3 points	 Has a clear and accurate claim that unites the piece Chooses relevant evidence to support the claim Groups related evidence in a way that sufficiently proves the claim Includes clear, precise language with minimal redundancy Grammar and spelling meet grade-level expectations
70% (C) 2 points	 Gestures toward a claim, but the claim is not sufficiently explicit or clear. Therefore, the argument is unfocused Supporting evidence is weak because it is vague, irrelevant, repetitive, or not compelling Occasionally groups related evidence, but the structure and organization of the piece does not propel the argument forward Language contains redundancies and lacks precision Grammar and spelling is below grade-level expectations
55% (F) 1 point	 The argument is only minimally correct or clear Includes little to no relevant evidence Lacks organization and structure Uses imprecise language and convoluted sentences, and demonstrates little command over language Grammar and spelling is below grade-level expectations
0% (F) 0 points	 The argument is completely inaccurate or incomprehensible Lacks grade-appropriate professionalism and must be re-done
