# Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality Understanding Quality Measurement

Quality measurements typically focus on structures or processes of care that have a demonstrated relationship to positive health outcomes and are under the control of the health care system. Technically, the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality defines a quality measure as a mechanism to assign a quantity to quality of care by comparison to a criterion. Health care quality measurement for children is the process of using a scientifically sound tool to assess the extent to which children are receiving quality health care in any of the Institute of Medicine quality domains.

## **American Medical Association Foundation Health Literacy**

Health literacy is the ability to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services needed to make appropriate health decisions and follow instructions for treatment. A recent government study estimates that more than 89 million American adults have limited health literacy skills.

# <u>Association of American Medical Colleges Guidelines for Use of</u> Medical Interpreter Services

The Organization of Student Representatives has developed a resource for medical students who need additional guidance in the use of a medical interpreter during interactions with patients with limited English proficiency (LEP). Students can use the medical interpreter card during encounters with patients with LEP as a basic reference for interpreter options and their appropriate use.

# **Building Your Medical Home Toolkit**

Brought to you by the AAP/MCHB/National Center for Medical Home Implementation, the *Building Your Medical Home* Toolkit supports the primary care pediatrician's development and improvement of a pediatric medical home. It also prepares a pediatric office to apply for and potentially meet the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) Physician Practice Connections Patient Centered Medical Home (PPC-PCMH) Recognition program requirements. The toolkit can help a practice assess and improve its medical home capacity with resources and downloadable tools organized into 6 building blocks that provide guidance for implementation.

- Care Partnership Support addresses family access and communication.
- Clinical Care Organization addresses standards for practice organization and use of clinical information.
- Care Delivery Management addresses the promotion of clinical care that is consistent with scientific evidence, as well as patient and family preference.
- Resources and Linkages addresses successfully linking patients and families with community resources to help meet their needs.
- Practice Performance Measurement addresses the organization and promotion of safe and high-quality care.
- Payment and Finance addresses the need to match quality care and NCQA recognition with payment and value.



#### **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services**

The Administrative Simplification provisions of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA, Title II) required the Department of Health and Human Services to establish national standards for electronic health care transactions and national identifiers for providers, health plans, and employers. It also addressed the security and privacy of health data. As the industry adopts these standards, the efficiency and effectiveness of the nation's health care system will improve with the use of electronic data interchange.

### **Cultural Competence Assessment—Primary Care**

The Cultural Competence Assessment—Primary Care can be administered to families to elicit feedback about their experiences with their children's health care. Knowledge of a family's experiences and perceptions is a critical factor in improving cultural competence in the practice setting.

## **Multidimensional Scale of Perceived Social Support (MSPSS)**

The Multidimensional Scale of Perceived Social Support (MSPSS) is a validated 12-item instrument to address family support, support from friends, and significant other support. Higher scores denote a higher level of perceived support.

# <u>US Department of Health & Human Services Office of Minority</u> Health

The Office of Minority Health (OMH) was mandated by the US Congress (PL 101-527) in 1994 to develop the capacity of health care professionals to address cultural and linguistic barriers to health care delivery and increase access to health care for people with LEP. Additionally, this mandate directs OMH to support research, demonstrations, and evaluations to test new and innovative models aimed at increasing knowledge and providing a clearer understanding of health risk factors and successful prevention intervention strategies for minority populations.
