Why the new Writing Helper?

We're really excited to bring the new Writing Helper to you for many reasons, and whether you're a new user using Writing Helper for the first time or if you're familiar with the Windows or Mac versions and are migrating over to this new version, we hope you see the same value we do in this roadmap. We've listed some of the big benefits of the new version below.

1. **Designed for accessibility and usability:** The new Writing Helper is a streamlined user experience (UX) with intuitive design patterns that users are familiar with. It has accessibility 'baked in' so it complies with best practices and guidelines making it easier to use for everyone, as well as more compatible with tools like Read&Write and ClaroRead.
2. **Improved user flow through the process:** There has been a focus on solving user sticking points related to the flow through the Writing Helper process from stage to stage. For example, moving from the Question to Structure stages, and moving highlights from Sources to Snippets.
3. **Automatic updates for users:** Desktop apps need to be installed on the user's computer and require users to search around an app store and download, including updates. Apps built like the new Writing Helper on the other hand will see all updates automatically pushed out requiring more installation stages each time there's an update, allowing us to be much more

agile and ensuring users are always up to date.

4. **Consistency across devices:** The user interface (UI) design balances a feature-rich design with a clean, simple user experience, making sure Writing Helper looks and feels consistent across different devices.
5. **Chromebook use:** Windows and Mac users have enjoyed the benefits of Writing Helper so far, but now we have this new version we're providing the exact same functionality to Chromebook users also.
6. **Consistent with other Texthelp tools:** It is consistent with other Texthelp web tools like WriQ, so this redesign helps bring Writing Helper more into the family of products.
7. **Scalable design:** All of the components that make the new Writing Helper are reusable and scalable so the future design of features or other enhancements to the product can be delivered more quickly and consistently, and to a higher design standard.
8. **Focussed development support:** Harmonising one application that can be run from different platforms means there is only one user experience compared to native apps installed on various devices. This also means we can focus our development on one product rather than spread our resources across different versions of the same product. For a native app, this involves app design, app testing, deployment and different versions of the same product would always be somewhat out of sync with one another in terms of features and benefits.

Roadmap

11th January 2023

The new Writing Helper brings you the best of accessible web technology to help you work on your writing projects regardless of platform. It brings all of the core functionality of the existing Windows and Mac version of Writing Helper but we do have a few features yet to add to this version before it has full parity with its cousins on PC and Mac devices.

We will be splitting up our development into two main phases as we approach full feature parity with the Windows and Mac versions. We're calling these **soft parity** and **hard parity**: soft parity brings the bulk of the key features that existing users enjoy already; and then hard parity will fill in all the smaller details. Soft parity will be with users in the new year, and hard parity in Spring. After that, we will be looking at new features and benefits, so watch this space for more information.

The following lists the new features and benefits we will be adding, in the short term. Feel free to use [this form](#) to let us know about any feedback or suggestions you have for future releases.

Remaining work for soft parity in early 2023

Source types

We will allow the opening of Word documents and improve the handling of inaccessible PDF documents so that you can import a wider range of sources into your projects.

Easy-to-install app

The cherry on top for the soft parity launch early this year will allow users to sign in once with their email and licence key. Existing users will be able to easily move over to the new version whilst new users can be set up with Writing Helper really simply. Users can sign in with Google, Microsoft or UniLogin credentials to make this really easy. Writing Helper will be installable as an app on Windows, Mac and Chromebook devices.

Hard parity, some time in Spring 2023

Web sources

We want you to be able to open any type of written evidence source in your Writing Helper projects, and the list of file types is expanding all the time. Our next priority is to allow websites to be opened and converted to PDF in the new version, just like you can do in Windows and Mac.

Keyword search

In Sources for Windows and Mac you can search for keywords and phrases to find useful information and capture highlights more easily. This will be built into the new version in the new year as part of hard parity.

Dark mode

This is of growing importance and proving crucial for so many users, particularly as we spend more time at our screens. Dark mode allows some customisation and personalisation of your experience but also can help reduce the light stress on your eyes, which is very important ergonomically. Readability for dark mode is significantly better for many users too!

Visual mapping integration

We know that visual mapping isn't for all learners, and we encourage you to use the tools that work for you when it comes to exploring your open concepts and your project brief. However, for those of you who do get benefits from visual mapping tools, we recognise the enormous value you can get, so we will be reintegrating popular visual mapping tools to the Question review tab after we have implemented it.

Publish settings

We will be adding more settings for your Published document such as changing the displayed errors, reference style and more.

Advanced snippet placement

A little used but valuable feature in Windows lets users be more specific about which sections and subsections they organise their snippets into. We'll be including this for hard parity.

Post parity - shiny new things!

The features and benefits above will bring the new Writing Helper to parity with the existing desktop versions but we won't be finished there. We have lots more planned to continue to improve the writing experience for our users, including some excellent suggested features from you, so please do keep those coming! For example, we're

looking at improved colour picking and customisation of themes, better file access, improvements and extensions to your Structure, possible new Publish outputs, interoperability with other tools like Global Tasks and ClaroCapture and many more things. We won't prioritise these just yet, so do let us know what is important to you for the future.

Release notes

Version 1.6.0

1st February 2023

We've made some improvements to our Published documents and our Instructional Verbs in this release.

Firstly, the new Publish settings. You'll now find a settings menu which includes a number of new features to improve your published document:

Previously, various errors would be shown in your exported Word document. These could be 'incomplete metadata', 'incomplete task', or 'needs rewording'. We've renamed 'incomplete metadata' to 'incomplete citation data' to be more clear, and you can now toggle off all of these errors if you wish.

Moreover, each of these errors now has a unique highlight colour in the word document to make it much easier to differentiate between them. You can also choose to include or exclude; section and subsection headings, incomplete task warnings; and unused citations.

Finally, our Instructional Verbs dictionary has been improved to include more book sources and revised source links for some words.

Version 1.5.1

17th January 2023

Some minor bug fixes and quality of life improvements in this version only. Capturing open concepts in the Question stage has been slightly improved, and you can remove open concepts by clicking them on the left panel now.

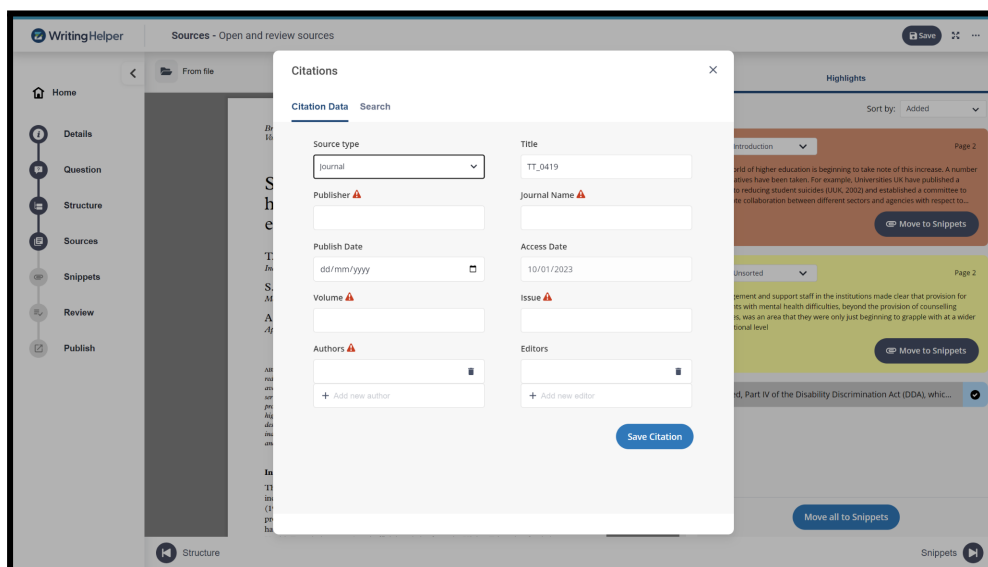

We kick off 2023 in style with improvements to the Reference Manager feature, and loads more quality of life and interface improvements.

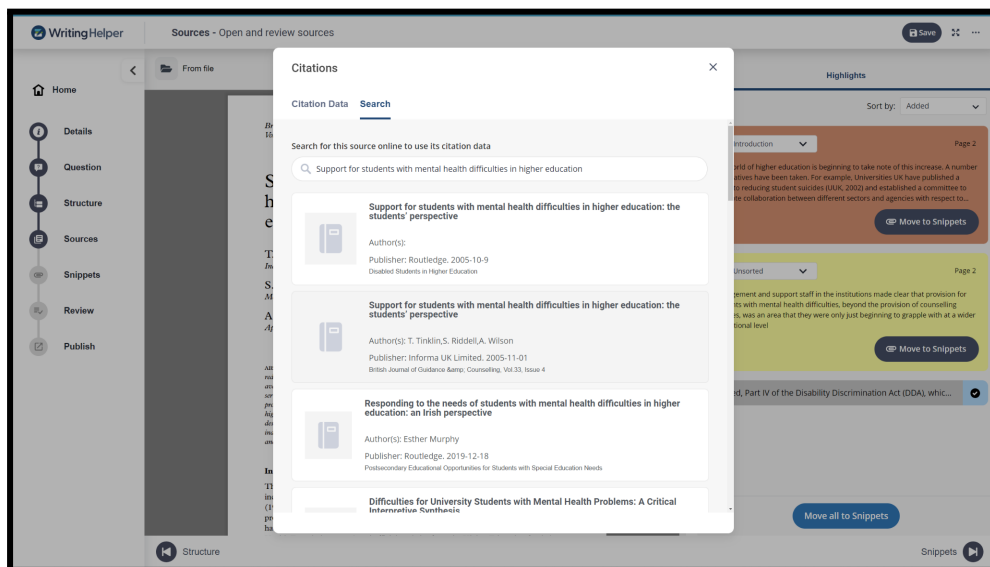
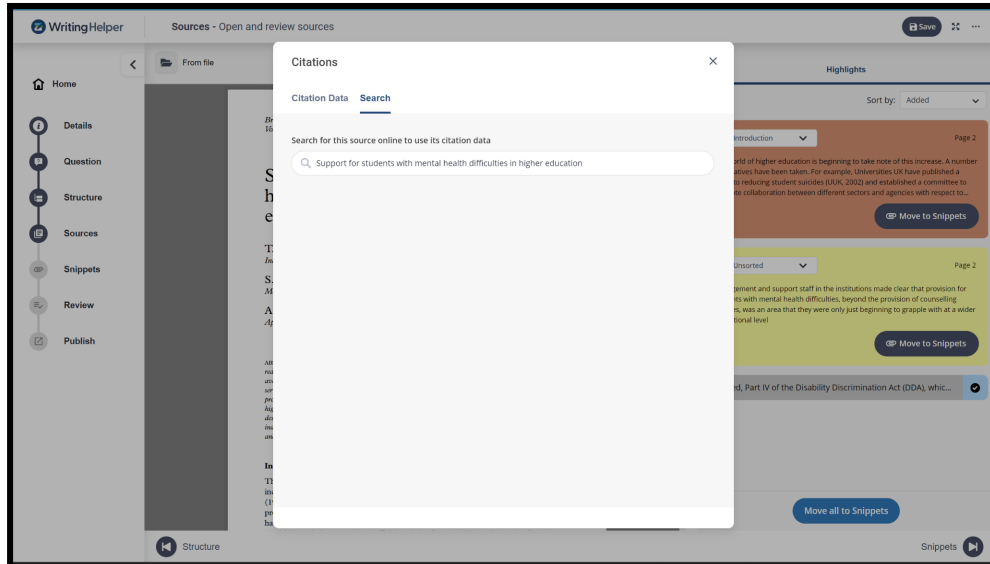

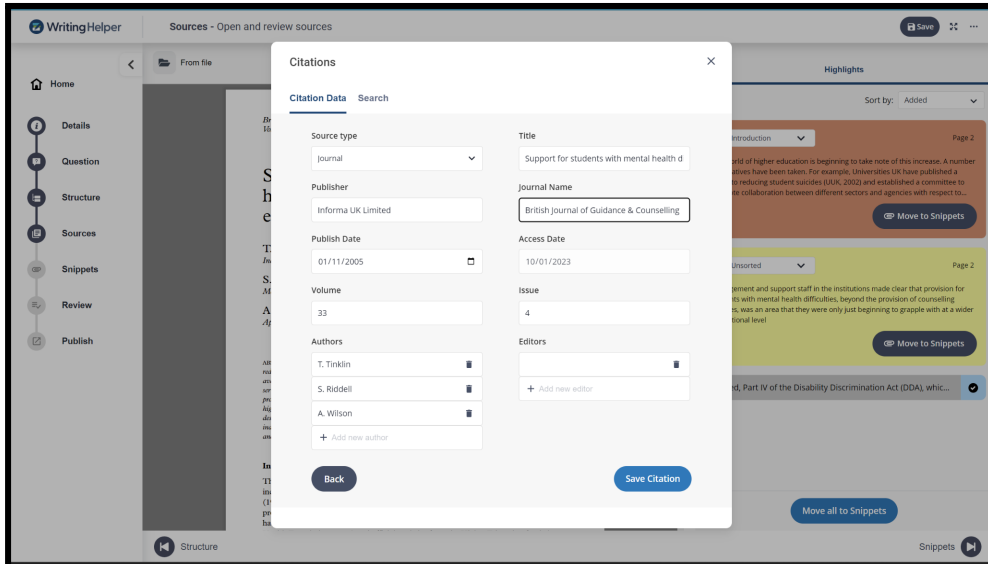
When you change the source type to either journal or book, you will now see a Search tab at the top of the Citations dialog. This will allow you to find the citation for your source really quickly, and populate the fields so you don't have to worry about copying and pasting lots of information. Having citations and references managed more efficiently will allow you to focus on the writing instead.





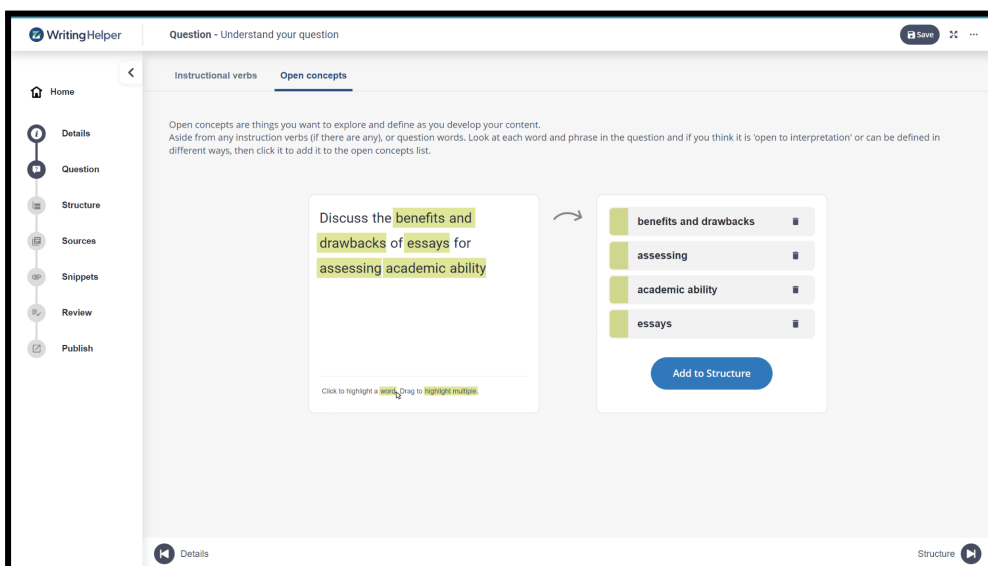

Cleaner open concept capturing

As well as multiple-word open concepts, you can now select them by dragging or clicking. Open concepts that are next to each other now have a clear gap, so it's much easier to differentiate them so you can be sure that you're understanding and identifying the right open concepts relevant to your question.

Import with context

We introduced the import structure feature, as well as the ‘push open concepts to structure as tasks’ in the previous release, and both features are great for improving your focus and productivity. We’ve further improved how these two new features work together in 1.5.0: when you import a structure, Writing Helper will check to see whether you’ve made any changes to the default 6-section structure that comes with new projects. If you haven’t, then the imported structure will fully replace the default one. If you have, then the imported structure will be appended to the end instead.

We realised that by adding the open concepts to an unchanged default structure, and then importing a structure, Writing Helper was assuming that changes had been made. We’ve fixed this now: adding open concepts to the structure as tasks won’t be seen as a change to the structure, so you can import to replace the default structure without impacting the open concept tasks.

‘Quick create’

This is a really simple change, but one worth mentioning: in the Structure Stage, when you create a new Section, Subsection or Task, you will be automatically able to edit the label of that element. You can now create your structures much more easily.

Jump to highlight

Another simple change that is also worth mentioning: when you have captured a highlight, you can click on that highlight in the right hand side panel to jump to the page where that highlight is located. This is also true for highlights that have been moved into Snippets. We’ve added some shading effects to the highlight tiles to make this more clear too.

Version 1.4.0

21st December 2022

This final release of the year marks the fourth successive fortnightly release as we rapidly approach soft parity for the new year. We’re particularly excited about this one, not just because it’s the holidays, but because we’ve introduced a new feature

here that Windows and Mac users haven't seen, which relates to the use of Open Concepts in the Question Stage. Read on to learn more.

Import structure

A favourite feature from Windows and Mac is the ability to import structures that you have used in previous projects. This saves you from recreating familiar structures repeatedly, particularly when you have some degree of consistency in structure that you apply to many pieces of work. It's in the same place, in the Structure Stage, and you can click on the new **Import Structure** button on the toolbar. This will show you all the other projects that the new Writing Helper has been given access to, and you can select which you need, then preview and import. If you haven't loaded the project you want yet, you can use the **Browse** button to find a project (perhaps one you're bringing in from Windows or Mac) to load it into the new Writing Helper.

Push open concepts into Structure as Tasks

Despite our drive to give you full feature parity with the Windows and Mac versions, this small feature that is specific to the new version was too good to pass up! You can now move your open concepts, once you've identified them in the Question Stage, straight into your Structure as Tasks. Windows and Mac users will be familiar with the flow from QUESion to Structure, but it always invites you to 'explore' your open concepts. We've recognised that this is a task in itself, so pushing these concepts into the Structure Stage as actual Tasks makes a lot of sense, as well as improves your flow through the Writing Helper process.

Quality of life

In addition to these new benefits, we've fixed and changed a few smaller things too: you can now select multi-word open concepts; your name is auto-populated in the Details Stage (and we removed the built-in Chrome autofill which showed things that weren't names); and we've improved performance in a few places, with some highlighting tweaks and changes to menu behaviours.

Version 1.3.0

7th December 2022

We've been working hard on improving the sources you can open in your Writing Helper projects for this release, and you can now open compressed PDFs, and inaccessible documents will be sent for OCR and returned as accessible versions so you can capture highlights and enjoy improved readability with your text-to-speech tools. As well as support for inaccessible PDFs, you can open images of text now (like .jpg and .png files) which will also be sent to OCR for conversion. As well as this there are a number of performance improvements.

Version 1.2.0

23rd November 2022

Most of this release is 'under the hood' as we've improved performance and optimised a number of features. You will however now be able to make the application full screen to remove the distractions of any other open tabs. The version number is now also displayed in the menu so you'll be confident you're always up to date with Writing Helper.

We've also added links to our help documentation and product feedback form so you can learn more about how to make the most of Writing Helper, and let us know how you're getting along. If you have any feedback for new features, or if you simply want to let us know how you're finding the Writing Helper experience, you can now let us know more easily.

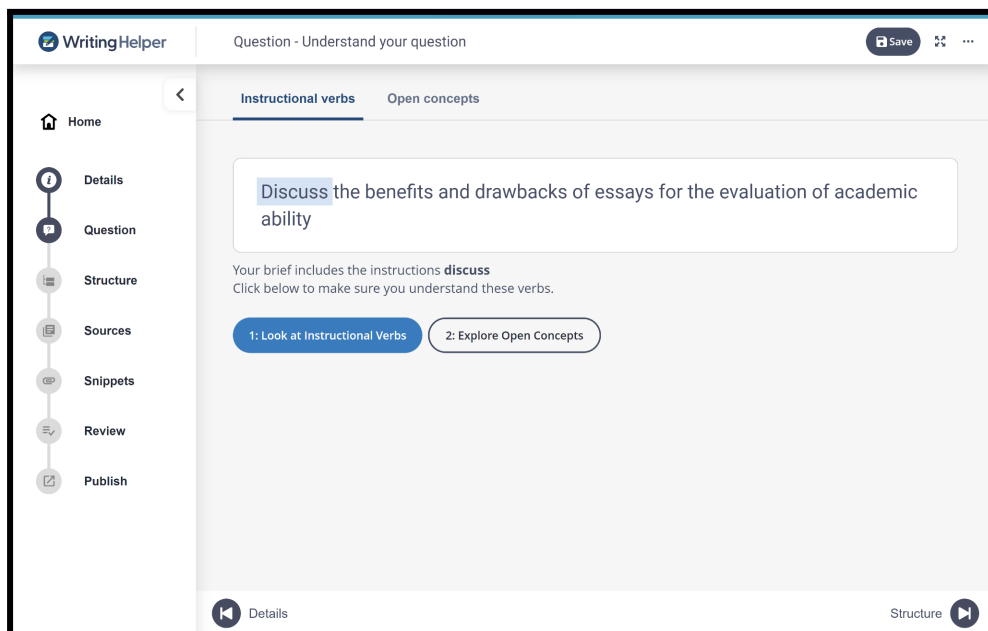
Top of the list when we released the new Writing Helper was to implement the Question Review tab that on-boards learners onto the writing process so well in the Windows and Mac versions of Writing Helper. We have gone a step further with the new version with a new design and layout to improve discoverability and flow through these foundational early steps.

The writing process begins, just like any task, with an understanding of what the task actually is. What's required? What does 'success' look like? What is the 'definition of done'? So often we can forget to give enough attention to this early foundational phase, especially with regards academic assignments.

The Question tab has now been added to the new Writing Helper, at the start of the process, to enable you to consider the title of your project and really think about what you're being asked to do: from the core instruction in the question, through to the open concepts (words or phrases that need definition, consideration or explanation) to help you seamlessly move on to developing a really solid structure for your piece of writing.

We have taken all the best bits from the Windows and Mac versions of Writing Helper and added huge improvements to the accessibility and usability. You can now enjoy a cleaner and more linear flow through navigating the implications of your writing project brief.

The core instruction



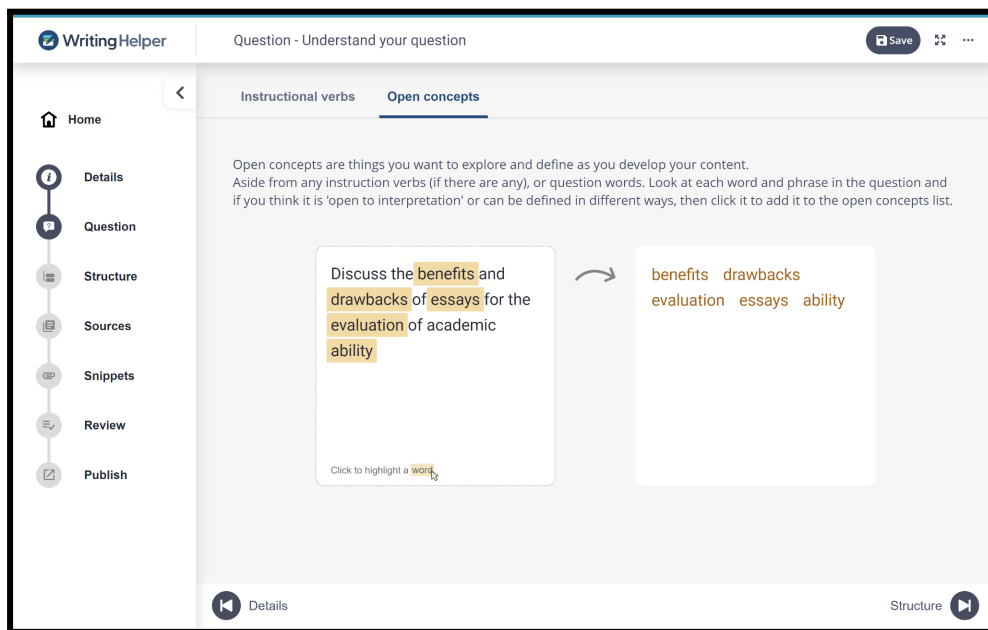
Writing tasks will always have an instruction, which very often takes the form of an explicitly stated verb, such as 'discuss' or 'describe'. Sometimes the instruction is

implied though, with words like ‘why’. You can see accessible definitions of a multitude of instruction verbs at this stage. Any explicit verbs included in the question will be identified.

The open concepts



Questions will always have words or phrases that you will need to explore, define or consider. Click these in the ‘open concepts’ area so you can identify the core elements of the question before you move on to start structuring your writing in the Structure tab.

We are working hard on OCR and Reference Manager to continue bringing this version up to full feature parity with the Windows and Mac versions, so this update is one of many that we have planned in the coming months. We hope you’re enjoying the journey.

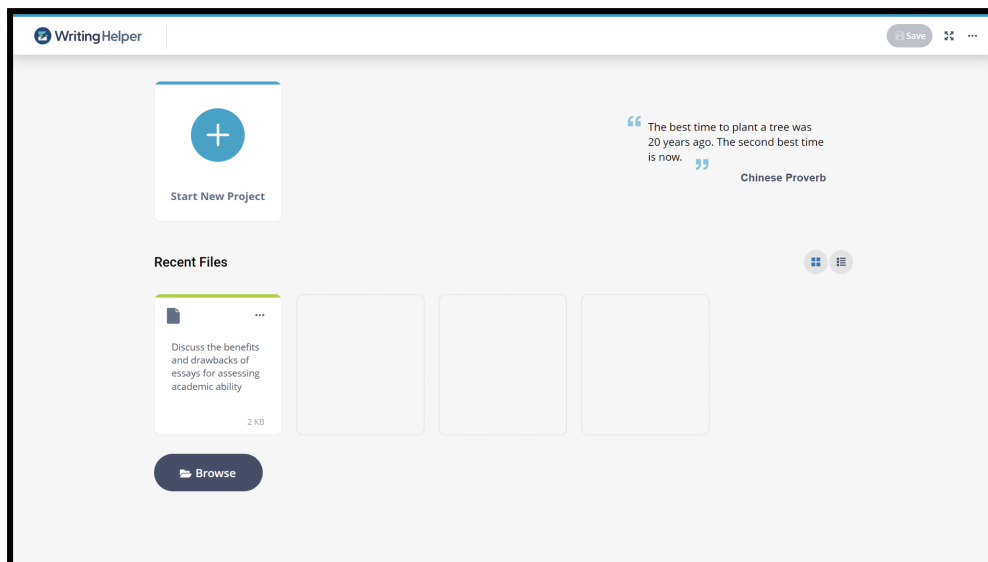
This launch release of the new Writing Helper is a showcase of accessibility and web technologies to bring the Writing Helper experience to more users in a faster, more



The Welcome Window presents a clean, new design to allow users to access, manage and create projects. Existing projects from Windows or Mac can be loaded using the 'browse' button.


Details
